### **Mets Rebuild Begins in Earnest**

Mets owner Steve Cohen was pretty clear, this year will be a rebuilding year for the Mets. He knows this to be true because he took a \$353 million payroll, the highest in Major League Baseball in 2023, and blew it up around the trade deadline when it became increasingly obvious that the Mets would miss the postseason for the sixth time in the last seven years. The rebuild is all-encompassing, yet bizarre. Carlos Mendoza steps in as manager, replacing Buck Showalter. The general manager role won't be filled in 2024 and was made vacant when Billy Eppler "resigned" after MLB launched an investigation that Eppler and the Mets misused the injury list. There are many new faces on the payroll in 2024, several of them prospects, after New York dealt the likes of Max Scherzer and Justin Verlander, among others.

#### **Batting**

For the kind of star power that the Mets possessed in the lineup, the offense was largely underwhelming in 2023. Don't blame **Francisco Lindor**, who had his best season in Met pinstripes and joined the 30-30 club for the first time in his career. He's missed just three games over the past two seasons and he's finished in the top 10 in NL MVP voting in each of those years. Add in his gold-glove caliber defense at shortstop and you get a 6.0 WAR, which tied him for 8th among all position players in MLB. **Pete Alonso** saw his batting average take a dive down to .217 for the season but he smashed a ton of home runs yet again and earned his third All Star nomination while driving in a team-high 118 RBI and he still draws a fair number of walks. **Brandon Nimmo** and **Jeff McNeil** are known more for their ability to hit for average, although the former connected for 20 home runs last year while the latter won the 2022 batting title. McNeil's average fell to .270 but his career average is just a notch below .300 and the Mets are hopeful his 2024 batting more closely resembles that career mark.

The back half of the lineup is where the question marks begin to appear. Gone are players like Mark Canha, Daniel Vogelbach, and Tommy Pham, and the Mets didn't bring in a lot of reinforcements other than Harrison Bader. Low Woodle and Turner Touler are now additions but both project to be bond player.

than **Harrison Bader**. **Joey Wendle** and **Tyrone Taylor** are new additions but both project to be bench players as opposed to starters, although they could be used as platoon options. **Starling Marte** started to show his age last season and it's unclear how many games he can be counted on to play heading into his 13th major league season. **DJ Stewart** found success with the Mets in the second-half of the season and will look to fill the void left by Vogelbach. **Francisco Alvarez** is limited at the plate but he's a borderline-elite pitch framer despite being just 22 years old.

### **Pitching**

It's certainly no secret that the Mets rotation in 2024 will look vastly different than the one that opened the 2023 season. Even **Kodai Senga**, the ace of the staff, will miss at least a month with a strained shoulder. The Japanese sensation Senga signed with the Mets prior to the 2023 season and baffled MLB hitting last season. He was the runner-up to Corbin Carroll for the NL Rookie of the Year, he was an All-Star, and he received Cy Young votes. Control can sometimes be an issue for Senga but his stuff is simply ridiculous and his "ghost fork" pitch was, for all intensive purposes, unhittable. While they wait on his return, veteran **Jose Quintana** figures to be a top-of-the-rotation pitcher. He recently turned 35 and he'll need to find a way to get outs effectively on the ground as he no longer possesses the ability to strike out double-digit batters like he did earlier in his career. **Luis Severino** and **Sean Manaea** join the rotation. Severino was once the ace of the Yankees but his 2023 season was a complete disaster. However, his Yankee teammate Tommy Kahnle revealed in an interview that injuries were a major contributing factor. He was good in 2022 in 102.0 innings and the Mets desperately need him to return to that version of himself. Manaea doesn't have the upside of Severino but he's been far more reliable and has 30 or more appearances in each of the last three seasons, albeit with an average ERA of above 4.00. **Adrian Houser** is another new face who spent six big league seasons with the Brewers.

The bullpen gets a huge lift with the return of **Edwin Díaz**. When we last saw him in a Mets uniform, he was entering to the beat of Tommy Trumpet and carving up hitting in the ninth inning. Unfortunately, that was in 2022 as a freak injury in a World Baseball Classic celebration cost him the entirety of the 2023 season. He's expected to be fully healthy in 2024 and should again be one of the game's best closers. **Adam Ottavino** and **Brooks Raley** are two very capable arms and quality set up pitchers and **Jake Diekman** pitched well for the Rays last season. **Jorge López** and **Shintaro Fujinami** were free agent signings from the Orioles.

#### The Bottom Line

Love him or hate him, Steve Cohen was at least honest with Mets fans when he set expectations of a rebuilding year in 2024 (and maybe 2025). However, there are still some good pieces on the roster so don't expect the Mets to just fall off a cliff unless the injury bug really gets ahold of the team.

There are depth questions in both the lineup and the rotation but the duo of Lindor and Alonso is a great one-two punch. The bullpen figures to be a strength despite a rocky performance last year. The Mets will flirt with .500, but nothing more.



Alonso's batting average won't look good on the enormous scoreboard hovering over center field in Citi Park, but few can bash home runs like the Polar Bear. He's clubbed 192 homers in only 684 career games and he wields an OPS of .870. It's a contract year for Alonso, so expect the big first baseman to be extra focused and productive. While he strikes out a lot, he draws a lot of walks and he also had the painful distinction of being hit by pitch the most of any NL player. He had 118 RBI last season and if Nimmo, McNeil, and Lindor continue to get on base at a high percentage, he'll top 100 RBI for the third straight year.

# PROSPECT TO WATCH Jett Williams - SS/OF

Williams hasn't even made it past double-A yet, but the Mets top prospect already has a huge selling point: his elite eye and plate discipline. Last year in 121 games, he drew a whopping 104 walks (second in the minor leagues) which gave him an on-base percentage of .425. He was a pitcher's worst nightmare on the base paths, stealing 45 bags while being caught only seven times. Jett also lived up to his first name by legging out eight triples. He'll have to make some necessary adjustments as he works his way from double-A to triple-A but the fact that he is already debuting such impressive skills at only 20-years-old is very notable. He only appeared in six double-A games last season so his big league debut probably won't come this season, but when it does, he'll have a chance to become truly special.
